AN INTRODUCTION TO SCREEN HERITAGE PROGRAMMING

The approach is significantly less straightforward than simply booking a film from a distributor and involves allocating more time for research and discussions on licensing and availability with the archives.

However, as the FAN members referenced in this document can testify, archive film can offer programmers multiple audience building approaches - ranging from local interest screenings, historical interventions, retrospective feature programmes, live musical accompaniments and immersive, experimental events - that can connect venues to new audiences, communities, organisations, and partnerships. And, the pay-off for the additional effort is all the more rewarding when film audiences attend venues to experience unique insights, hidden visions and untold stories from the archive beyond the new release programme.

To unpack and clarify further, below are a selection of guides on how to go about building audiences for archive film screenings.

If you are attempting an archive programme for the first time or you simply need a refresh on what you need to consider, then the best place to start is with The Independent Cinema Office's (ICO) guide to **programming archive film** which provides a comprehensive overview on sourcing archive film, programming & equipment factors and marketing your event. Following on from Film Hub North's UK-wide FAN screen heritage programme (2018-2022) their **Screen Heritage Best Practice Guide** aims to demystify the archive process further by drawing on key FAQs from programmers recorded across the four-year activity. It also platforms example activity across traditional, experimental and immersive style screenings and details guidance on how to best collaborate with the RNAs.

Contrary to that notion that it is challenging to attract young audiences to archive screenings, Film Hub South East's Young Programmer Network's **A Young Person guide to archive programming** presents how themes and programme formats can be appear to young audiences, supported by accessible case studies co-curated by young programmers (16-30).

For those who seek a romantic and more analogue engagement with film then look no further than The Independent Cinema Office's An Introductory Guide to Film Projection & An Introductory Guide to Cinema Audio, a complete guide on how to project 16mm and 35mm film.

Similarly, if you are a community venue interested in setting up a film screening in your area in collaboration with a regional archive, seek out **Cinema For All Guide to Equipment** for all your non-theatrical, equipment based questions.

ADVICE FROM FAN PROGRAMMERS

Programmer Samantha Andie Bennett reflects on curating, programming and exhibiting the touring archive film **The Auld Game which** celebrates the history of Scottish women's football that toured Scottish community's venues using material from The National Library of Scotland's Moving Image Archive.

Staying in Scotland, the site-specific film festival Cinescapes **experimented with immersive, outdoor experiences** with archive footage projected onto community and heritage buildings in Edinburgh.

While based at Phoenix, **Asif Vehvaria writes** on the history of film preservation, the importance of archival work and the ways these collections brought audiences together in Leicester.

Produced in collaboration by imitating the dog and The Dukes, **Lancashire Electric** was an imaginative theatrical experience that mapped North West Film Archive material onto the walls and staged props in The Storey Gallery.

This case-study unwraps the multiple activities involved in **Cinema Rediscovered 2022** and details joys of classic cinema on the big screen featuring re-releases, restorations, keynotes, Q&As, workshops, and touring packages by guest curators.

Here, **South West Silents** reflect on the atmospheric experiences of delivering silent film with live score performances to audiences in the south west and beyond, and set out guidance on the correct screening approaches of projecting silent film with musical accompaniment.

Laura Kloss, founder of **Lightbox Cinema** offers tips on how to deliver enhanced activity alongside archive screenings such as interactive workshops with young people using **silent cinema equipment, 16mm film, and magic lanterns**.

Sourcing archive material from a wide range of collections, programmer Herb Shellenberger presents ways to supercharge and diversify your archive film programming.

And staying on that theme, **London Community Video Archive** match material from their unique collections alongside titles from LUX to explore how community groups now can collaborate across grassroots video production.
